NPHS Math Teacher, John Haynes, Receives State Recognition

EAGLE RIVER, WI – Northland Pines School District is honored that John Hayes, NP High School Math

for Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST) by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction selection committee. John was one of four finalist named by the state.

State Superintendent Tony Evers commended John for representing "the best of a cadre of outstanding mathematics teachers in Wisconsin." He also congratulated all the finalists for earning this prestigious award that recognizes their dedication to teaching and student learning. Evers stated that during the 2012-13 school year there will be a state ceremony held to honor these teachers' exemplary work.

This state recognition will advance John, and the other finalists, to the national level where the National Science Foundation (NSF) convenes a selection committee to recommend up to two finalists in mathematics or science from each state. The Director of NSF will then submit the recommendations to the White House Director of the Office of Science and Technology Policy for final selection. National awardees will be notified by the White House and will receive an all-expense paid trip for two to Washington D.C., to attend a series of recognition events and professional development opportunities, a \$10,000 award from NSF, and an award certificate signed by the President of the United States.

Northland Pines District Administrator Dr. Mike Richie stated, "John is one of those extraordinary teachers

who has touched the lives of many students. His delivery of instruction and rapport with students is clearly remarkable. John has a way to challenge all students and bring out the very best in them." NPHS Principal Jim Brewer also congratulated John for this extreme honor and added, "It comes as no surprise to me to see John being recognized for his outstanding work in helping not only students but other instructors in his craft. He is a credit to this profession and I couldn't be prouder to have him on our staff." Dr. Richie reiterated "John Hayes is well deserving of this honor and is a huge asset to the Northland Pines School District."

Nominees had to complete an extensive written and video application that demonstrates their mastery of mathematics or science content; use of appropriate instructional methods and strategies; effective use of student assessments to evaluate, monitor, and improve student learning; reflective practice and lifelong learning to improve teaching and student learning; and leadership in education outside of the classroom. Nominations for the award can be made by principals, teachers, parents, students, or members of the general public.

Established by Congress in 1983, this program authorizes the President to bestow up to 108 awards each year. Awards alternate between elementary (kindergarten - 6th grade) and secondary (7th - 12th grade) teachers each year. Since the program's inception, nearly 4,200 teachers have been recognized for their contributions in the classroom and to their profession. Awardees serve as models for their colleagues, inspiration to their communities, and leaders in the improvement of mathematics and science education. Eradicating Poverty One Bead at a Time

On August 20th, at St. Albert's Cabrini Hall from 1:00-4:00pm, was a special party teaching about the conditions of extreme poverty in Uganda and how Bead For Life provides education and opportunity for women to become self supporting.

Bead For Life is an innovative poverty eradication organization that helps women by providing economic opportunities, not handouts. Women from Uganda make brightly colored beads out of recycled paper and fashion them into beautiful bracelets, necklaces, and earrings. Based in Boulder, Colorado, Bead For Life creates global markets for their unique jewelry. The women earn fair trade wages and are offered literarcy, numeracy, and entrepreneurial training to help them start sustainable small businesses. "Formerly surviving on about a dollar a day, they now earn enough money to feed their families, pay school fees, get proper healthcare, and have hope for a bright future."





KEEPING YOU POSTED info from USPS

"The world is moved along, not only by the mighty shoves of its heroes," social activist Helen Keller wrote in 1908, "but also by the aggregate of the tiny pushes of each honest worker." The Made in America: Building a Nation Forever® stamps honor the courageous workers who helped build our country.



This issuance features five different panes, each with the same 12 stamps, but anchored by different selvage photos. Three of the selvage images and eleven of the black and white stamp images were taken by photographer Lewis Hine, a chronicler of early 20th-century industry.

The panes are designed in three rows of four stamps. In the top row are an airplane maker, a derrick man on the Empire State Building, a millinery apprentice, and a man on a hoisting ball on the Empire State Building. In the middle row are a linotyper in a publishing house, a welder on the Empire State Building, a coal miner, and riveters on the Empire State Building. (The coal miner stamp is the only one of the 12 that does not feature a Hine photograph. The image is from the Kansas State Historical Society.) In the bottom row are a powerhouse mechanic, a railroad track walker, a textile worker, and a man guiding a beam on the Empire State Building.

On the selvage, Hine's images include two Empire State Building iron workers and a General Electric worker measuring the bearings in a casting. The fourth selvage photograph is the same image of the coal miner that appears in the stamp pane. The final selvage photograph, taken by Margaret Bourke-White, depicts a female welder.

Derry Noyes was the project's art director and designer. The Made in America: Building a Nation stamps are being issued as Forever® stamps in self-adhesive panes of 12and is now available at your local Post Office. You can also visitwww.usps.com for ordering and more information.

August 28th marks the 50th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's



speech. King originally designed his speech as a homage to Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, timed to correspond with the 100-year centennial of the Emancipation Proclamation.

From the PASTOR'S WINDOW by Pastor Skip Pullen



Skip Pullen is a pastor with Village Missions, serving the Upper Penisula of Michigan at the Watersmeet Bible Church.

It is hard to believe it is time to turn our thoughts to fall and going back to school. Going to school brings a promise of learning new things as well as being reminded of old habits. I was recently reading about some research that had been done on the benefits of having school all year long. The thinking behind this study was a concern over students losing some of the knowledge they had before school had let out for the summer, and the time it took to get students back up to speed when school resumed after the long summer break. This had me thinking about our spiritual learning. I think it is very easy to forget when it comes to dealing with our Christian faith, especially if we haven't been putting it into practice. It is good from time to time to go back to school spiritually speaking and revisit some of the truths we should already know.

One thing we can forget is that we are in a spiritual battle. The Bible tells us that believers are to be renewed in their minds, to put to death the old sin nature, and to put on the new man which is renewed in knowledge according to the image of Jesus Christ who has created us. (See Colossians 3). In our struggles with sin, it is important that we cooperate with the Lord in this regard. Often people can want to change, but due to their inward struggles they





see little success. Has God failed them? No. The problem most likely lies in their understanding of saying no to ungodliness and worldly lusts. It is good to want to change, but to pray and ask God to change you and to do nothing to move towards the things you say you want is foolish. A couple years back when I first saw that I needed to make some changes in my diet, it wasn't enough to just pray that God would take away the weight, I needed to take a look at my food choices. I could pray, exercise, and attend meetings all day long; but if I continued to eat in ways contrary to weight loss, I would never lose the weight or, in the very least, I would go from success to setbacks. From time to time people will tell me, "Pastor, I prayed about this area of sin, but God just didn't do anything. Maybe it isn't God's will." Something I have found, especially in dealing with deep rooted or besetting sin, is that people focus more on the sin than the Savior. Take my dieting example. If I wanted to lose weight, but all I thought about or focused on was the chocolate cake or the pizza on the counter, sooner or later I'm going after that cake or pizza. I needed to replace that desire with a good choice.

When it comes to sin, on one level we say we don't want the sin, but on a deeper level we like it or think it holds some benefit and don't truly want to stop. When we keep toying with sin, we shouldn't expect God to set us free. The Bible says, *A double*

minded man is unstable in all his way. This means his soul is divided between the things of God and the world. This person may say he or she believes in God at times, but fails to trust Him when trials, testing, or temptations arise; thus this person receives nothing. Again, it's about renewing our minds. It is about setting our minds on God things and not worldly things. Setting our minds on things above and not on the earth will help us to not give in to sin.

Another thing to recall is that sin never begins with God, nor is it the will of God. Sin begins in our hearts. We need to get serious about God, believe His way is best and for our good, and set our affection on Him. Christians often forget that God has called us to be holy and set apart for Him. We must not only sweep out the dregs of our old life, but fill our lives with Him; after all, it is God who works in us both to will and to do for His good pleasure. Do you need to go "back to school" spiritually speaking? Do you need to be reminded of what you once knew and how you are called to be dead to sin and alive to Jesus Christ? It may be difficult at first, but know as you set your mind on Christ He will be your strength in weakness. You can know victory not only in regards to the penalty of sin, but its power in your life. Why not talk to Him today?

Know that I'm praying for you.

to building his own cabins, Dan had made many friends and the first cabin was rented before it was complete to Coly and Fran Christie of Evanston, Illinois. The first cabin was consequently named the Christie cabin after their first guests. The second cabin, started in late 1951 and completed in 1952, was named the Von Cabin after the first season renters, owners of the Von Hoffman Press of St. Louis, Missouri.


The third cabin was completed in 1954 and named after the Kohler family who urged the Jeffersons to complete the three bedroom abode. In 1956, the Shipley 2 bedroom cabin, rented first to Jon Shipley, (an architect from St. Louis,) was also appropriately named.

Building continued each summer on the unfinished structures, but Dan always took time to guide his guests on fishing trips on North and South Twin and Long and Sand lakes. Wednesdays were fish fry nights and musky steaks were a favorite with the guests as family and guests would gather around the campfire eating and singing long into the night.

Freida and three sisters became partners and relied on help from their husbands, brother Russell, and youngest sister, Rita. Russell died suddenly in 1980, sister/partner Jean in 1991 and Freida, seven months later. NATURE NOTES • Field Crickets Acheta assimilis by Peter Dring



Peter Dring is a naturalist, photographer, and was Director of the world renowned Little Red Schoolhouse Nature Center for nearly four decades.

How can a cricket be used as a thermometer? If you hear a cricket chirping and you have a watch, you can estimate the temperature where the cricket is located. If you can hear more than one, you can tell whether they are experiencing different temperatures. To calculate the "cricket temperature," count the number of chirps in a 14-second period. Add forty to the result, and you have a rough estimate of the Fahrenheit temperature the cricket is experiencing.

Why does it work? Because crickets are cold-blooded creatures, the rate of their metabolism is strictly determined by temperature. The warmer it is, the faster they move and the faster they chirp. Crickets are often kept as pets in Asian countries because their chirping is considered beautiful and soothing. It is said that they are also something of a burglar alarm. Once they are accus-

tomed to members of the household, they will continue to chirp, stopping only when a stranger enters the room.

Keeping crickets is a simple matter. Catching them can be more difficult. You want to catch common black field crickets, which are abundant across most of North America. The males are the ones that "sing". You can easily tell the difference due to the female's long egg laying "tail", or ovipositor,


which they use to lay eggs under the surface of soil.

If you have difficulty locating wild crickets, places selling fresh water fishing bait often sell crickets. Never keep more than one male in the same cricket house. They are very territorial and will probably end up killing one another. A cricket 'house' can be simple or elaborate. The crickets don't care, as long as they are properly cared for. The key to choosing or

designing a cricket house is making it escape proof and fairly simple to clean. A large jar can be used, covered with a piece of fine screening or cheesecloth, fixed with a rubber band. You can also construct something a bit more elab-

orate. To make the crickets really feel at home, spread a little sand in the bottom of the box or jar. Adding a rock gives the cricket a place to hide if he wants. A few leaves and small twigs are nice finishing touches for recreating a natural en-

Keep the cricket house in a cool, shady place inside, away from any direct sunlight. Every so often, sprinkle or mist the "ground" with a little water. A small piece of

wet sponge or cotton ball will help maintain the correct humidity. Don't forget to change this every couple of days or so.

One cricket won't eat much, so try very small pieces of potato, carrot, apple, lettuce, and other fruits and vegetables (they usually don't like citrus), as well as fruit rinds and bits of bread. Experiment to see what your cricket will eat. Don't leave any uneaten food in the cricket house for more than a day or so as it will rot. You don't need to leave water for the cricket, as he will get all the moisture he needs from the fruit and vegeta-



HEALTH & WELLNESS Sneaky Germs

When we use the term 'GERM', in

general we are referring to bacteria, viruses, fungi (mold/candida), and/or parasites. Any of these will cause your body to function less than optimally. Sometimes vou know without a doubt that you have been 'infected' with a germ. The common cold or flu, a yeast infection, strep throat, etc. are all the cause of a germ. BUT you don't always know you're infected. These little buggers can hide for decades in little cocoon like formations until they feel like coming out and causing problems for you. Pretty nasty, huh. Not only do they hide in your body, but they hide in places around

in order to diminish your susceptibility to them. Here are several common hiding places that many people tend to forget.

- 1. Can openers. If you haven't thoroughly cleaned your canopener, you can be sure you're adding a plethora of germs to anything you are opening with it.
- 2. Makeup. Get rid of old make up and clean your brushes at least once/week
- 3. Cutting boards and cutlery holders. If you had microscopic eyes, you'd never use either of these.
 - 4. Telephones.
 - 5. Light switches.




